All pupils should understand the full range of learning opportunities that are available to them. This includes both academic and vocational routes and learning in schools, colleges, universities and in the workplace.

Schools: By the time students leave school, every student should have had a meaningful encounter with providers of the full range of educational opportunities, including Sixth Forms Colleges, Apprenticeship providers (including higher level), Further Education Colleges, Independent Training Providers & Higher Education Providers.

<u>Colleges:</u> By the end of their programme of study, every student should have had a meaningful encounter with a range of providers of learning and training that may form the next stage of their career such as; **Meaningful encounters with a range of Apprenticeship Providers, Further Education Providers & a Range of Universities.**

<u>Provider Access Legislation:</u> Ensure students have been offered at least two meaningful encounters in each phase with providers of apprenticeships and technical education during each key stage that meet the requirements of PAL.

Top Tips

- ✓ Schools have a multi-pronged approach to ensure students are well-supported to choose pathways they value post-18. Start this work long before students reach the point of decision as evidence shows that raising aspirations and building resilience is effective from Year 7 or earlier.
- ✓ Help curriculum staff to understand pathways from their subject so they can confidently talk about progression with students.
- ✓ Map out your destinations from previous years and look for gaps and trends. Are students clustering around particular universities or colleges? Did students pursue 'fallback' routes due to a lack of information about opportunities? Use this data to inform planning of opportunities and potential interventions for the next cycle.
- ✓ Create a transition programme detailing the provision on offer for young people at key transition points.
- ✓ Share as much information as possible with parents. Invite parents to in school transition talks / careers fairs.
- ✓ Careers Leaders should liaise with the careers advisor, SENCO & head of sixth form to monitor and track pupil intended
 destinations.
- ✓ Use the <u>Future Skills Questionnaire (FSQ)</u> to survey pupil knowledge and understanding about the various paths to ensure each pupil has a full understanding of the pros and cons of each route.
- ✓ Pupils who have SEND should be offered additional support with transition and intended destinations should be featured in EHCPs.
- ✓ Pupils who are looked after and those at risk of NEET should also be provided with additional support.
- ✓ For students leaving post 18/19 ensure they all have a transition plan in place and have access to information and sources of support to assist them with ongoing career development and employment.
- ✓ Use school newsletters and social media to promote pathways and opportunities.

The Provider Access Policy

The updated provider access legislation (PAL) has now been enacted and requires all schools to publish a policy statement on their websites. It specifies schools must provide at least six encounters with approved providers of apprenticeships and technical education for all their students between years 8 and 13, so they can find out about non-academic pathways.

Encounters with Further Education

Further Education colleges all offer a specialist programme of activities designed to equip young people, teachers and advisers with relevant and up-to-date careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) on the available provision.

Schools can request presentations, workshops, taster days and tours that can be delivered in school, or virtually. You can also order prospectuses direct from the college and make these available in the school library or form classes. Keep a log of Open Day dates and share these with parents in a timely manner. Encounters with Higher Education





Schools: By the time students leave school, every student should have had a meaningful encounter with providers of the full range of educational opportunities, including Sixth Forms Colleges, Apprenticeship providers (including higher level), Further Education Colleges, Independent Training Providers & Higher Education Providers

Colleges: By the end of their programme of study, every student should have had a meaningful encounter with a range of providers of learning and training that may form the next stage of their career such as; Meaningful encounters with a range of Apprenticeship Providers, Further Education Providers & a Range of Universities.

University recruitment departments provide outreach support to secondary schools and colleges to help prospective students, parents, teachers, HE Programs and Support tutors and advisers with impartial information, advice and guidance around Higher Education.

Take advantage of engaging programmes provided by each university for example: Presentations, Workshops, Campus tours & residentials.

Universities also deliver projects and activities in order to widen access for those students who are under-represented in higher education, specifically learners from low participation neighbourhoods, disadvantaged and low income backgrounds as well as students from targeted cohorts such as looked after children/care leavers, disabled students, young adult carers, estranged students, adult learners, asylum seeking and refugee students and students from minority ethnic backgrounds.

Some University faculties will also have their own outreach teams that offer a variety of subject specific activities such as presentations, tours etc – search for the faculty eg: Maths/Engineering on the university website to locate further information and contacts or ask the main school liaison link to help with this.

You can order prospectuses direct from the University and make these available in the school library or form classes. Keep a log of Open Day dates and share these with pupils & parents in a timely manner. Take a look at Opendays.com or find the dates on the University website. Encourage students to sign up for email alerts.

Supported Internships

Supported internships are a structured study programme based primarily at an employer. They enable young people aged 16-24 with a statement of SEN, or an Education, Health and Care plan to achieve sustainable paid employment by equipping them with the skills they need for work, through learning in the workplace.
